AGENDA ITEM: Transfer Application – CPLC Community Schools

2009-2010 Transfer Application Summary Report

CPLC Community Schools (formerly Calli Ollin Academy) filed a transfer application to transfer a current site, Calli Ollin Academy, to its own charter contract. CPLC Community Schools is an Arizona 501 (c)(3) non-profit corporation and was incorporated on July 31, 1996. CPLC Community Schools currently operates three school sites under two contracts; Calli Ollin Academy and Calli Ollin High School (both 9-12 and currently under the same contract) and Toltecalli Academy (9-12 and under its own contract). The applicant was originally chartered with the Arizona State Board for Charter Schools as Calli Ollin Academy with an effective date of October 11, 1996. With the transfer of the site to its own contract, the name of the school will change to Hiaki High School.

According to the Arizona Department of Education's ADMS Report 45-1, CPLC Community Schools (charter holder for two sites) had a reported Average Daily Membership (ADM) of 150.89 students in 2007. The ADM fell to 121.69 students in 2008 and grew to 124.29 students in 2009. CPLC Community Schools dba Toltecalli Academy had a reported ADM of 141.11 in 2007, 133.02 in 2008 and 134 in 2009.

Curricular Emphasis:

Hiaki High School uses the Expeditionary Learning Schools model. The model has five core practices; learning expeditions, active pedagogy, school culture and character, leadership and school improvement and structures. Knowledge of each student's level of understanding and participation leads teachers to differentiate instruction. Literacy is also a main focus. All teachers teach reading through learning expeditions so that meaning, context, and motivation drive the learning of critical literacy skills. The school believes that literacy is vitally important in that reading strategies are used in all courses. All students are given a screening test at the beginning of the year to identify students that may need additional attention in core subjects. The teachers then monitor those same students 3 more times throughout the year. That information may be used to make decisions related to curriculum and instruction.

Governance Structure:

The Corporate Board and Governing Board for CPLC Community Schools are one and the same. The Governing Board and the schools work cooperatively to promote high-quality culturally-based educational services to the community. The Governing Board is sanctioned to oversee the fiscal and legal compliance of the schools and maintain the schools in accordance with all state and federal statutes.

The mission of the additional charter is as follows:

To provide opportunities in a unique learning environment that emphasizes culturally based education. We serve communities through responsive programs that encourage individual growth. We graduate students who have experienced academic achievement, service to the community, and personal success.
